Club Meeting – 9th November 2010

With Christmas commitments starting to fill or calendars it was great to see such a good turn up for the November Meeting.

After general business we were fortunate to have Mark Miller (Mini Mark) along to talk on the pro's and con's of coming up tight on Bass in the Upper Tweed, Byangum area.

It is not hard to see why Mark has a passion for chasing bass in these beautiful surroundings.

This area is somewhat sensitive to changes that make the pursuit of bass a tad difficult at times. Water clarity and the natural environmental variations such as weed growth in the warmer months may call for a change of tactics. You can be rewarded with an early and late healthy surface bite in the warmer months. Mark has found that good placement, followed by the do nothing approach often works well at these times. Small gurglers and the like will often produce the goods. The typical pattern of when the sun gets higher the bass go deeper is the norm.

Patterns such as a small suspending fly fished on an intermediate line or smaller dark Clouser's with a rib of glow in the dark thread on the hook shank can draw a strike. If working your fly a little deeper, try one or two short sharp strips, followed by a pause. It is important to ensure you stay in contact with your fly as the bass will often make their move on the pause. Any slack line will often result in a miss on the strike.

The December club outing is titled the "Brian McDuffie Memorial" in memory of one of our dearly missed club members who passed away a few years ago. This outing is very popular with our club members and why not, such a beautiful location in memory of a great friend, and fly fisherman.

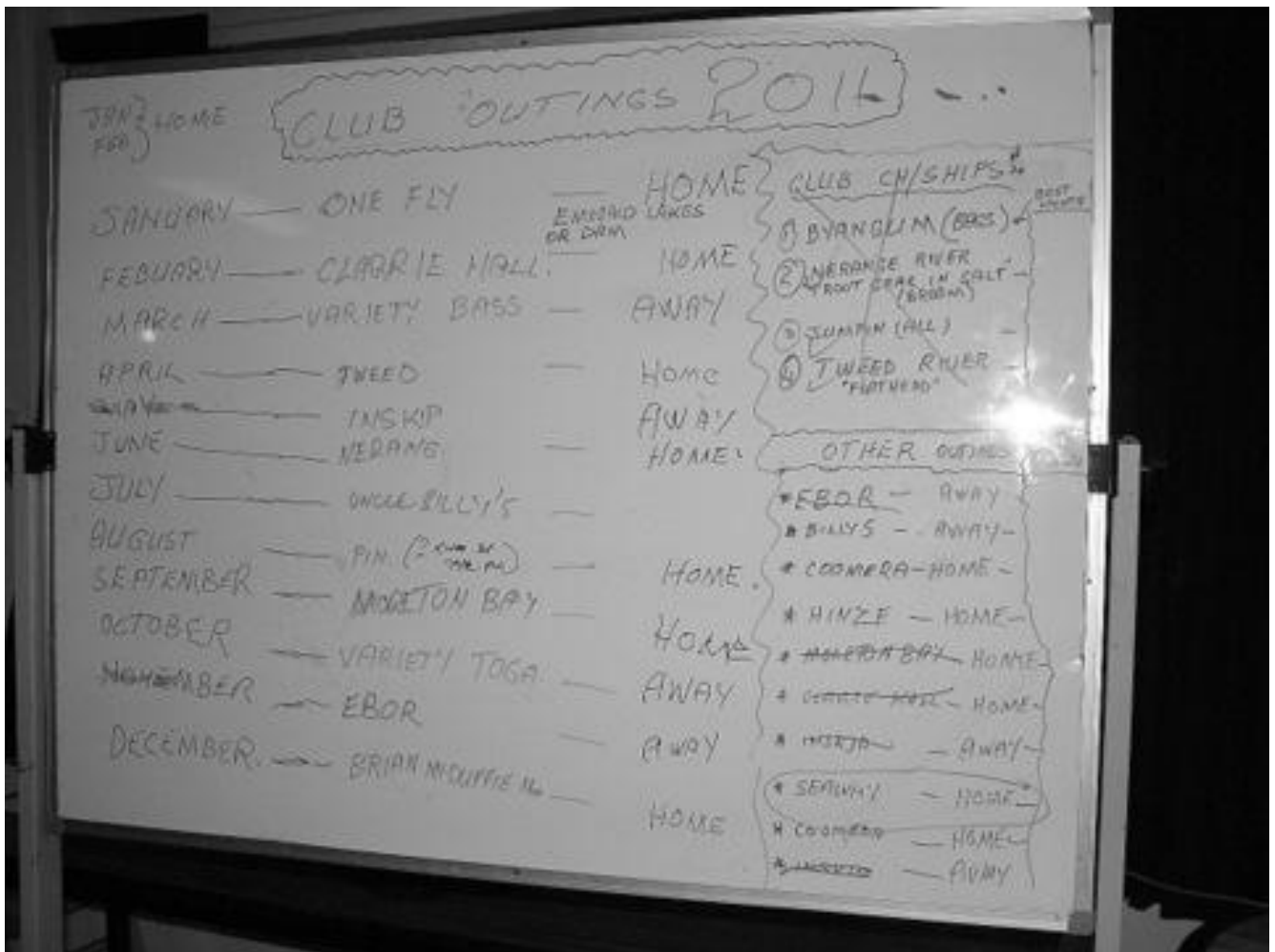
Looking forward to seeing you all there.

It was mentioned at the meeting that the response to the "Club Top Ten" and the "Club Records – All Species" was slow to get some runs on the board. With the holiday season just around the corner and hopefully some spare time on our hands we may turn up some results to kick start this section on the club website.

To refresh all members' thoughts on these areas, I have attached the guidelines for each outcome.



"Top Ten" Fish of the Year

RULES & GUIDELINES

- ✚ The competition shall run annually from the 1st August to 31st July each year.
- ✚ To be eligible you must be a current Full or Junior financial member of the SEQFFC.
- ✚ The fish has to be caught on conventional flyfishing tackle
- ✚ Fish can be caught at anytime i.e. does not have to be caught on "official" club outings.
- ✚ The Top Ten winners shall be announced at the Annual General Meeting each year.
- ✚ Each winner shall receive a gift voucher and a certificate

The "Top Ten" nominated species are:

- **Bass**
- **Saratoga**
- **Bream**
- **Flathead (Any Species)**
- **Tailor**
- **Trevally (Any Species)**
- **Tuna (Any Species)**
- **Tarpon**
- **Mackerel (Any species)**
- **Kingfish**

Geographical Boundaries

SEQ or Northern NSW Waters from Ballina to Hervey Bay (in line with the northern tip of Fraser Island)

Measurement of fish

- ✚ Where the nominated species has a fork tail the measurement shall be taken along the length of the fish from the lip to the start of the fork. Where the fish has a paddle tail then the measurement shall be from the lip to the end of the tail.
- ✚ The calculation of length measurement to be determined with the use of a rigid measuring device that has a stop at one end and shows single centimetre increments.
- ✚ Photographic evidence of the fish showing its size on the measuring device must be submitted to be eligible.

Club Records – Any Species

- ✚ The commencement date is the 10th August 2010
- ✚ The recording process for a species has no close off date i.e. it is ongoing
- ✚ Any species can be nominated for recording purposes.
- ✚ Once a species has been nominated for recording purposes that species will be displayed on the club web page and will then be available for upgrading by all club members.
- ✚ To be eligible you must be a current Full or Junior financial member of the SEQFFC.
- ✚ The fish has to be caught on conventional flyfishing tackle
- ✚ Fish can be caught at anytime i.e. does not have to be caught on “official” club outings.
- ✚ The nomination of a species capture, and/or the upgrading there off, shall be presented at one of the scheduled club monthly meetings.
- ✚ Only the longest capture of any species will be displayed on the current records. I.e. The latest upgrade.
- ✚ The required process of verification of the capture shall be presented along with a verbal description of “Where, When and on What Fly” at the club monthly meeting.

Geographical Boundaries

There are no geographical boundaries for this category.

Measurement of fish

- ✚ Where the nominated species has a fork tail the measurement shall be taken along the length of the fish from the lip to the start of the fork. Where the fish has a paddle tail then the measurement shall be from the lip to the end of the tail.
- ✚ The calculation of length measurement to be determined with the use of a rigid measuring device that has a stop at one end and shows single centimetre increments.
- ✚ Photographic evidence of the fish showing its size on the measuring device must be submitted to be eligible.

We will soon have our 2011 calendar up on our site, mark some dates out for yourself and join us.



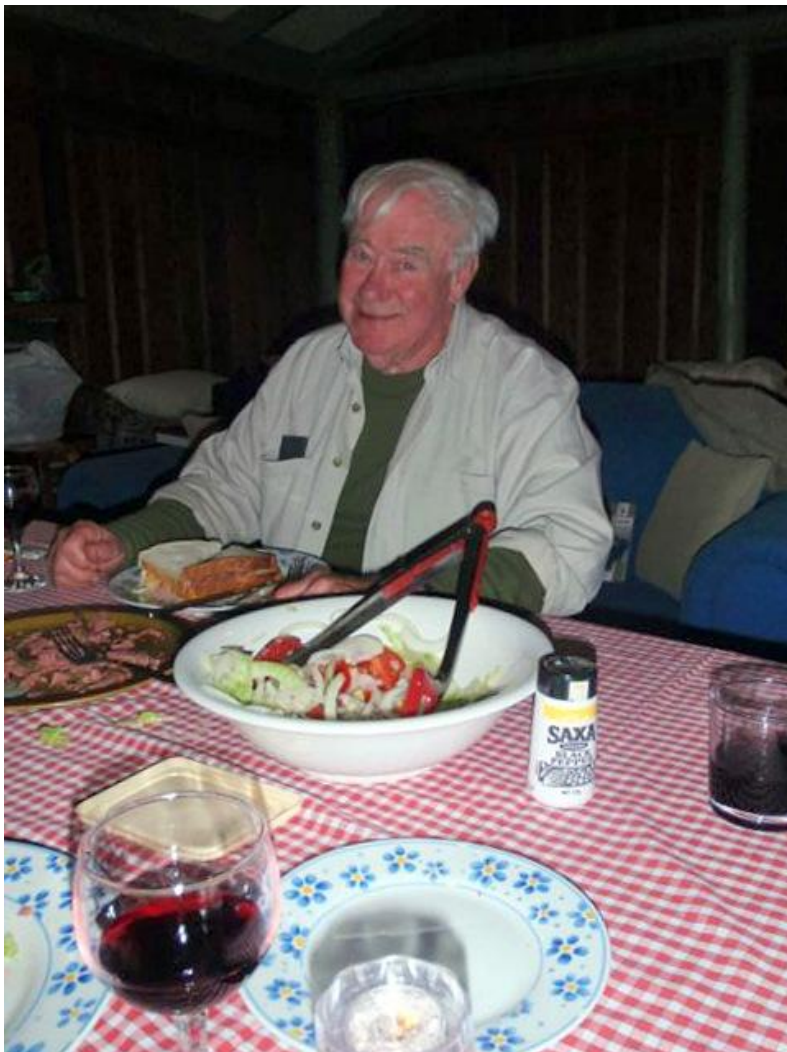

The Cooks Corner

Redclaw Pizza

I have used Redclaw meat in this recipe but in fact any seafood that is readily available or captures you taste buds can be used. Something that is often overlooked when designing your pizza master piece is that our poetic licence goes into overdrive, and we add ingredients that totally over power the flavours of our primary subject ingredient. Keep it simple is often delivers the best outcome with pizzas.

Another great thing with pizza is that you can prepare and cook them in so many situations. I have cooked pizza dishes in the home oven, the covered BBQ, Webber BBQ and in the old faithful Camp Oven, using either fire coals or heat beads as a fuel/heat source. Basically any cooking environment that will maintain close to 200C heat for 25 to 30 minutes will deliver the desired results.

Preparing the Redclaw for Cooking

Prepare 700g of halved Redclaw tails:

- . Individually wash live Redclaw using a garden hose
- . Place live Redclaw in freezer until they cease movement
- . Twist off the heads and discard
- . Use a large bladed sharp knife to split tails down the middle
- . Remove intestinal tract and any legs still attached
- . Thoroughly clean fleshy side in cold water

NB:

20-24 average sized Redclaw produce about 700g of cleaned tails. 700g of cleaned Redclaw tails yield approximately 500g of delicious flesh.

Unlike crab and prawn meat, the flesh of the Redclaw tends to except freezing. I have frozen Redclaw tails after marinating and thawed them out for a later cook up. They are great in risottos and marinara mixes as well.

Some prefer to leave their catch of Redclaw alive in a large container covered with water over night. They add just a pinch of table salt to the water. This is done to purge the intestinal track of the Redclaw. To settle the Redclaw for removal of the tails, I change the water from the night before and cover with water again. I then place 3 or 4 2litre bottles of frozen water with the Redclaw. As the water temperature drops the Redclaw settle. Much easier to handle and more humane.

Preparing your Pizza

Ingredients

Lebanese Bread for pizza bases. (If having trouble finding them Vince will nock you up a batch)

700 grams of Redclaw tails (700 grams (approximately 24 average tails) was plenty for 3 pizzas.

Tomato Paste

Light shredded Mozzarella Cheese

Mushrooms, capsicum, onion and any other additions that take your fancy

Freshly ground black pepper, salt and a sprinkle of oregano. (optional)

Method

- ✚ I like to put some olive oil in a pan and do a light cook on the Redclaw tails. This makes it much easier to remove the meat from the shell using an ordinary round end table knife to prize the meat out.
- ✚ Ensure your cooking environment is up to around 200 C.
- ✚ Place pizza bases on suitable cooking dish. (Round pizza cooking dishes with a thicker metal base are good)
- ✚ Baste the Lebanese pizza base with a liberal coating of tomato paste.
- ✚ Then add your mushrooms onion, capsicum and other desired ingredients.
- ✚ Add the Redclaw meat to the ingredients.
- ✚ Sprinkle with salt, freshly ground black pepper and oregano to taste.
- ✚ Place a liberal amount of light Mozzarella cheese to cover your creation.



Looking Good

With your cooking environment up to around **200 C.** your pizza is ready for the hot stuff.

Typical cooking time will be around 25 to 30 minutes depending on the cooking environment. Have a gecko at your master piece after 15 minutes to check how things are progressing. If the cheese is starting to brown nicely and I looks like a pizza then your can be fairly certain that is on the money. If cooking more than one pizza in the same cooking space be aware that the top section of the cooking space will be hotter than the bottom. Another reason for checking on your master piece between glasses of wine.

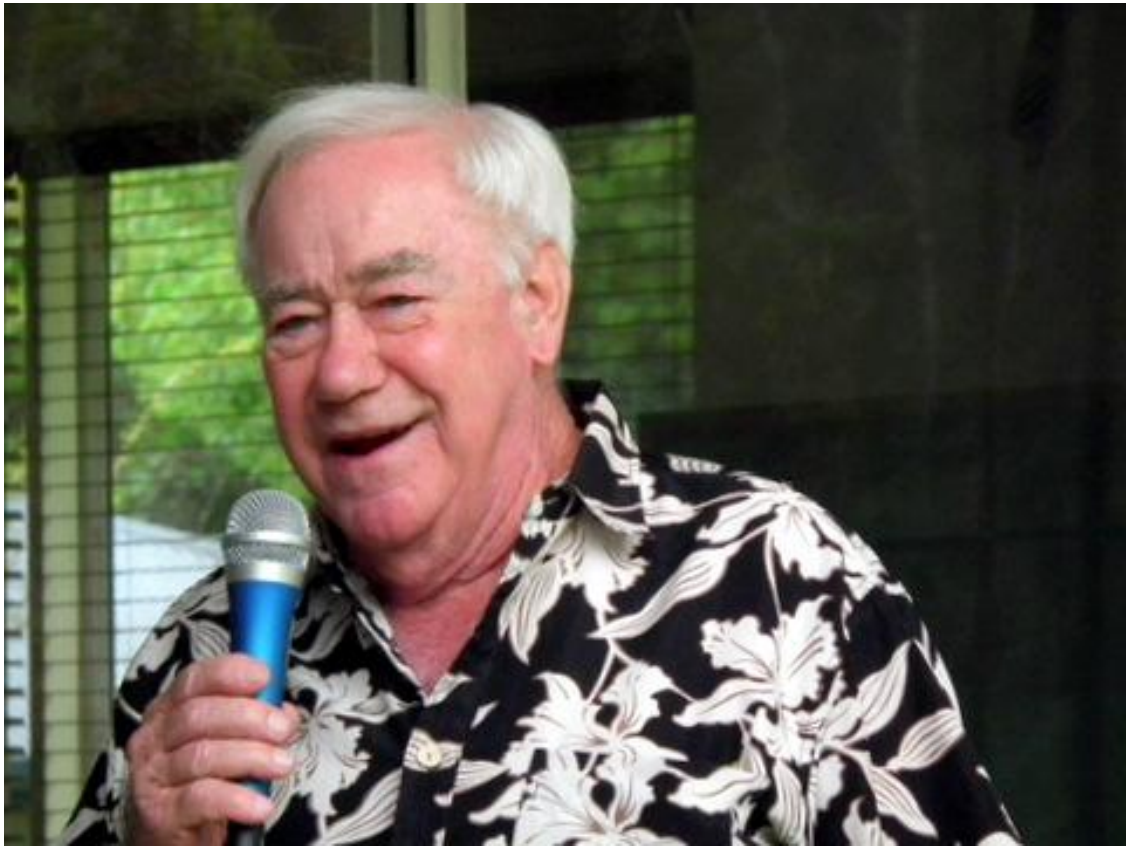

One Fly Outing - Emerald Lakes



Emerald Lakes Mud Map

The club "One Fly Outing" is set on the club calendar for the 16th January at Emerald Lakes on the Gold Coast. Emerald lakes are frequented by a hand full of our club members who have been rewarded for their time spent on the water there.

The lake is fed from the Nerang River at its eastern end. On a making tide the water pushing in can have a strong turbulent impact on the surrounding area. There are pathways surrounding much of the lake so access is flat and easy. Like most locations it can be that the early bird will catch the worms. There is not a lot of shade around many of the surrounds of the lake so carry ample drinking water and cover up. As you turn into the Emerald Waters estate off the Nerang- Broadbeach road drive in a short distance and turn left into the estate. By continuing along the northern shore line you will come to a car park area. There is a launching area there that will accommodate boats and smaller craft. There are restrictions that apply to the size of the motor permitted on the lake. From memory I think it is 4HP, but do some further checking with Kruger or Dean on that one.

To the right of the launching area there is a sandy stretch of water. There is also structure such as bridges to fish around. Emerald Lakes is the home to several species of fish. Trevally, tailor, giant herring, bream, and flathead, just to name a few. Many of these specimens are large and have been working the lakes healthy bait population over for many years.

To my knowledge there are no toilet facilities in the immediate area, so it might pay to wear your waders. The turn off on the Nerang- Broadbeach Road on my UBD street directory is Map38, F11.

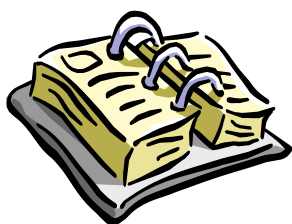
